

For over a century, our approach to addiction has focused on punishment and morality. We built policies, systems, and treatment based on the idea that addiction is a personal failing. Even though we now recognize it as a public health issue, our actions haven't caught up. Funding, care models, and clinical approaches still reflect this outdated view, making it difficult for people struggling with addiction to get the help they need.
